Our class meets on Thursdays from 10-noon on April 3, 10, 17, and 24.

Topic

How do you narrate the story of women's old age? So many events that shape fiction—courtship, marriage, coming of age—happen to young people. How do you write a novel—or a short story—about the later part of life? We encounter failures of mind and body, grief and loss, death. Yet these novels also reveal resilience, humor and gestures of reparation. In this course, we will study works by four prize-winning contemporary women writers that portray women in old age.
